

<u>Literature Review</u> <u>Coronial Recommendations</u> {Pertaining to SAR & Recreational Safety}

Recap Issues 26 – 11

Executive Summary:

The Coroner inquiries into a range of unexpected deaths to establish the identity of the person who has died and the cause and circumstances of their death.

While inquiring into a death, Coroner may make recommendations or comments for the purpose of reducing the chances of further deaths occurring in circumstances similar to those in which the death occurred.

The Office of the Chief Coroner issues a quarterly publication, titled Recommendations Recap. During the course of this Literature Review, sixty-three Search and Rescue (SAR) related incidents were considered over 16 issues.

In a number of cases the Coroner endorsed the Safety / Prevention messages already provided by relevant Recreational Safety agencies involved in the SAR Sector.

A number of recommendations have been useful in giving authority to stimulating discussion / action to improve existing safety measures / prevention messages in hazardous environments.

The recommendations have also stimulated user groups and interested people to convene and seek solutions to the problem.

It is also evident in the majority of cases, Government Departments, Local Government and communities have been proactive in making improvements to signage or messaging on Websites, in advance of Coronial deliberations.

The Coroner's recommendations have also highlighted the importance of the collaboration between the Coroner's Office, other Government Departments and organisations in the recreational space.

The Chief Coroner's Office has also commissioned a detailed analysis of death, associated to "Recreational Boat Deaths" (2015-2016) Recap Issue 15 and "Hiking" Recap Issue 11, which are very informative.

It is clear the Coroner relies upon the proactive Safety Messaging provided by the various disciplines and those involved in the Search and Rescue Sector.

The support that each provides to the other, is significant and plays an enormous role, in keeping those involved in their outdoor recreational endeavours safe.

Without visiting each site, it appears the vast majority of recommendations have been actioned.

Regrettably, despite the best prevention efforts of those involved in the recreational safety in the SAR Sector, people are still dying.

1. Recommendation:

- 1.1 Notwithstanding the Coroners need to remain independent and recognising the passage of time between and incident and the Coroner's Recommendation being published the Office of the Chief Coroner and/or the SAR Secretariat convene a 6 monthly / yearly "Emerging Trends / Prevention Meeting" (virtual or otherwise) to discuss the mitigation of the areas of concern.
- 1.2 That the SAR Secretariat meets with the Chief Coroner's Office, on at least a yearly basis to offer advice on Search and Rescue Capabilities and Limitations.
- 1.3 That there is further analysis on the effectiveness of the Recreational Safety Prevention messaging.

2. Introduction:

The purpose of this Literature Review, is to review and collate all the recommendations that relate to SAR by theme or type.

Within each theme analyse the SAR related Coroner recommendations and establish is that recommendation is, still relevant – not yet addressed, still relevant – addressed in part or full or is no longer relevant.

Identify and comment on any current programmes or activities underway that are of relevance to the recommendations.

The recommendations reviewed were those published by the Office of the Chief Coroner, in the Recommendations Recap, Issues 26 – 11.

3. Review Methodology:

Identify and read cases that have relevance to Search and Rescue (SAR & Recreational Safety).

Review the recommendations and collate all recommendations that relate to SAR by theme or type.

Within each theme;

- (a) Analyse the SAR related Coroner recommendations and where possible identify each recommendation as;
- (i) still relevant, not yet addressed
- (ii) still relevant, addressed in part or full, or
- (iii) no longer relevant.

Identify and comment on any current programmes or activities underway that are of relevance to the recommendations.

4. Findings:

Safety initiatives have often been instigated ahead of Coronial recommendations being issued;

Coronial recommendations have not been proffered because the issues are well recognised and prevention advice provided by established agencies.

The number of reviews totalled sixty-three.

The number of deaths totalled seventy-one.

On thirty-one occasions the Coroner has endorsed the advice provided by the relevant agencies.

On forty occasions the Coroner has endorsed the existing safety advice.

On thirty-three occasions the Coronial recommendations have served as a valuable / important prompt, for Government Departments / Organisations / Local Government to highlight hazards and amplify the recommendations.

There were twenty recommendations requesting improvements to signage and eleven recommendations that the hazard is highlighted on the relevant website.

Recap Issue 15 – Has a comprehensive analysis of "Recreational Boat Deaths" [2015 – 2016]

Recap Issue 11 – Has a comprehensive analysis of deaths associated with "Hiking"

Across Recap Issues 26 – 11, there are forty-eight Water related incidents (53 victims), ten deaths associated with Climbing – all but one in mountainous terrain, four with Tramping and three with Hunting.

5. Conclusions:

In the majority of cases District Councils / Regional Councils have been proactive in mitigating further risk, that is, either erecting "hazard signs" or fencing, prior to the Coroner issuing his/her recommendations.

Government Departments, Agencies, Organisations and Interest Groups are proactive in promoting safety messages in their respective areas of responsibility / recreational activities.

The intensity of these messages is aligned to the respective seasonal activity.

National Media outlets often report on the incident but the Coronial recommendations are not that prominent.

Local Media devote greater coverage to Coronial recommendations.

Water related activities are the most hazardous, followed by those activities associated with Mountaineering, Tramping and Hunting.

Coroners recommendations are supported by many existing Prevention and Safety messages.

There are a number of excellent Recreational Safety Campaigns in existence. The Personal Locator Beacon (PLB) and Plan My Walk campaigns, initiated by the MSC whilst in the aquatic environment, Water Skills for Life (Water Safety NZ) are and will make a difference.

Often, in close proximity to a person participating in an outdoor recreational activity, is their engagement or lack of with a Hazard sign.
